

The Rev'd Peter Godden writes:

How are your Christmas preparations going? As this *Newsletter* hits your doorsteps, it will be start of Advent – the time when Christians are called to prepare themselves spiritually for the celebrations of Christmas, and the welcoming of Christ afresh into our lives and our world.

Wanting to embrace Advent fully, I tend to do most of my practical Christmas preparations way ahead of time – especially everything for our Christmas services here at St Dunstan's.

This meant that, all the way back in August, I spent a sunny day immersed in the liturgy (that is, the words and rituals that make up a service), the scriptural readings, and of course the music of Christmas. I spent a particularly large amount of time weighing up which carols were going to make the grade, and which would be rested again until 2025. It's no easy task! And so it was that, whilst the nation was enjoying sunbathing and ice creams, the Rectory was alive with the sound of Christmas music. My wife found this all bemusingly entertaining – that is, until I decided to play Wham!'s *Last Christmas* for a laugh, at which point I was told that this was a step too far for the height of summer (and don't worry, I haven't selected it for Midnight Mass).

Whilst the Christmas offerings of Wham!, Band Aid, Slade and the rest probably do all belong solely in the yuletide season, other parts of the festive celebrations are most definitely not just for Christmas – not least the way in which the story at its heart reveals God's love to us.

The most famous Bible passage that is read out at Christmas services is probably the prologue to St John's Gospel, where St John opens up for us what an incredible thing it is that that the God who created the universe and everything in it cares for us so deeply that He chose to take upon Himself our human nature and share what it is to be human with us.

This means that you, by definition of being human, are so precious, so esteemed in God's eyes, that God the Son leapt from His throne in heaven into this world for your sake and for the sake of everyone: to love us, to minister to us, and to save us. We call God being born among us the 'incarnation', and we cannot hear about this too much, for it reminds us how much we are worth, and how much we are loved.

Last Christmas probably does belong firmly in December, along with a whole other heap of traditions that make the season distinctive. But the revelation of God's love in the Christmas narrative belongs at the centre of our lives every single day.

May the joy of Christ's birth be yours this Christmas, and for ever.

I hope to see you soon.

The fully equipped hall is available for church and associated events.


It is available for people to use after Christenings, weddings, funerals and other services. It is also available for hire to local community groups and charities, and is very popular for hosting small classes.

Report on meeting of the PCC 1st October 2024

In the October meeting of the PCC, members continued their discussion of the draft policy to admit children to Holy Communion, in the light of Diocesan comments. Following this discussion, all members of the PCC who were present indicated that they were in favour of taking this step in the life of the church, and a vote to adopt the draft policy achieved the required majority in order to be passed. As a result, the policy will now be sent to the Diocese with the hope that it will receive episcopal approval.

At every meeting of the PCC, reports are received from various groups and teams. The prayer group has indicated that they would like to receive more requests for prayers from the different groups within the church, so you are encouraged to let Rev'd Peter Godden, Jill Iredale, or Angeline Vere know if there are any such requests.

Many of you will know that the church was affected by some recent localised flooding. We were most grateful to some of our neighbours, who helped to avoid any serious damage to the building. We now have some sandbags available to help avoid any future flooding.

A discussion of the hall fees was held and it was suggested that a lower block of £20 for two hours be offered in addition to the current options to hire the hall of £30 for four hours and £45 for eight hours. This proposal was unanimously adopted by the PCC.

Finally, with the imminent departure of Rev'd David Williams from St Mary's Princes Risborough, the role of Team Rector for the Risborough Team also becomes vacant. The PCC agreed to, and voted in favour of the proposal that the appointment of a new Team Rector follow the same structure, terms and conditions as the existing post.

The next meeting of the PCC will be on 4th December.


What sort of a Christmas card person are you?





The Rhode to Church

Confession time; this year my husband Patrick and I were really disorganised with organising our holiday. We wanted a destination that provides everything from history and architecture to peaceful pools to read beside and excellent food. In the end, we arrived in Rhodes at a hotel with no sea views (how did we manage that?!) but a gloriously dramatic and rocky Greek hillside for a backdrop.

Daylight revealed a less-than-glamorous phone mast with a white outbuilding beside it, perched in the cedars at the very top. But a hill is a hill! The law of everything dictates that it must be climbed, so after a couple of days of reading beside the pool, we packed rucksacks with water and snacks, and found the trail. Although we could only see a phone mast, there was apparently a monastery at the top, so my motivation went up a few notches.

The trail was steep, dusty, and rocky, but we paused regularly to take in the view. We were joined by scrawny-looking goats, songbirds, and dragonflies. The scorched ground was strewn with bizarre plants, including one that looked like piles of chicken wire. After a while, the trail petered out and we picked our way towards a steep slope and found ourselves on a driveway, leading to 300 broad steps, numbered in white paint at every fifth one.

A steady trickle of people, locals and tourists rubbing shoulders, passed up and down. My eye caught signs that this is not just a tourist spot; piles of stones were carefully placed on a small plateau in the shade of the cedars. Onwards and upwards, zigzagging back and forth, we continued until the trees broke to reveal the pristine, whitewashed walls of the 'monastery', brilliant against a perfect blue sky.

The building we saw from below, and dismissed as a utilitarian shack, was a place of pilgrimage.

We stepped into a courtyard paved with round stones in different colours picking out geometric designs. The monastery (more like a chapel) was a simple building with a ledge for people to light candles, and inside a large painted icon of the Blessed Virgin Mary holding baby Jesus in an ornately carved wooden frame. Beneath the icon, hanging on colourful ribbons, were metal tokens embossed with baby feet, hands and eyes, and rows of wax baby figures. Photographs of babies and children were tucked into the frame. Outside I found a plaque which explained it all.

Many years ago, before the monastery, a wandering shepherd saw something glinting on the hill. He saw it again, so went to look closer, and found an icon of



Mary and Jesus beside a flickering candle, which he brought down to the nearby village. Word reached officials in Cyprus, who came to see the icon and recognised it as one that was missing from their monastery. They took it back, but shortly afterwards the icon reappeared on the hillside. It was returned to Cyprus, only to reappear again on the hillside. It was agreed that the icon should remain where it apparently wanted to rest, and the Panayiya Tsambika Monastery was built.

A vigil lamp was kept lit, and it became a place of pilgrimage. As often happens, people came to pray to Mary for a child of their own, including one lady who had difficulty bearing a child. She told her husband that she'd found a discarded wick from the vigil lamp and had swallowed it as she prayed. She fell pregnant, and according to the account, she bore a son who, as he emerged from her, clutched a tiny wick in his hand.

Now I could understand the wax babies beneath the icon, many of them bearing wicks. They, and every metal token and photograph were a prayer of yearning, of thanks, of joy, of sadness, but above all of hope. Behind the wall of candles, scratched into the sooty wall, are the names of children.

The trees outside were festooned with ribbons, toys, bracelets and medallions. I watched silently as women, sometimes with partners, paused in the cool darkness, gazed on the icon, crossed themselves, and reached out to touch the frame. Even the most hardened groups of tourists fell silent.

This was not what I expected when we set out to walk to a phone mast with a shack... It was a beautiful and deeply moving reminder that God will often speak to us when we're not listening. Please know that I said prayers in the chapel for all who, in whatever way, patiently walk the path of parenthood.

Ninth Child

At long last Duke Federico da Montefeltro could pose proudly with his ninth child and only son Guidobaldo. Federico had been made Duke of Urbino by Pope Sixtus IV in 1474, and under Federico's leadership Urbino became one of the most powerful and cultured states of Italy. His boy Guidobaldo was about 4 or 5 in this very large painting, a legitimate son for whom he had waited all of his adult life.

His first wife had died childless in 1457, so taking no chances, aged 40, he had married 14-year-old Battista Sforza, the highly educated and clever daughter of Signor Allessandro Sforza of Pesaro. Battista bore Federico 8 daughters in 11 years, all but one placed early into politically expedient marriages. The last daughter Chiara wisely became a nun. Finally her 9th child Guidobaldo was born in 1472 and Battista died 6 months later, as well she might. She was 26.

In tones of red, brown and silver, Duke Federico is somehow, in spite of his armour, seated on his high throne under a nice perspective wooden ceiling. He is reading one of his hefty tomes at his lectern, on top of which is a conical hat encrusted with pearls and gold thread, a diplomatic gift from the ambassador to the Shah of Persia for services rendered. His sword is strapped to his side. All the many portraits of the Duke are shown in profile, as he had foolishly left the visor of his helmet open during a joust to entertain a mistress, and a lance had broken the bridge of his nose and taken out his right eye. (A discouraging sight, surely, for his 14-year-old bride.)

His chivalric honours are proudly displayed: his Order of the Ermine bestowed on him by King Ferrante of Naples, and on his prominent armoured leg is his Order of the Garter awarded by Edward IV of England. In the right-hand corner is his helmet (with its visor wisely closed), its dented crown a reminder of the lance which had struck out his eye.

Fragile little Guidobaldo (1472-1508) leans against his father's red-draped knee, holding the sceptre which signified the continuation of the Montefeltro dynasty. It is engraved with the word 'pontifex', alluding to the Pope's granting of the right of succession. The child is wearing his heavily bejewelled ceremonial robes, his neck and sparse hair adorned with pearls.

Pedro Berruguete, the presumed artist of this painting, was Castilian, Court Painter to King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella. With other foreign artists, he worked on the decoration of the resplendent Palace of Urbino's ducal library. (You can visit the fantastic Palace today.)

The Duke's impressive tome seems to block his hard-won son from his sight, reminding me of the many parents I see glued to their mobiles, ignoring their tablet-holding infants. Let us hope that little Guidobaldo is gazing out at a devoted mother-substitute.

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






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
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
