

The Rev'd Peter Godden writes:

Have you still got your Christmas decorations up? This may seem like a daft question, as most people observe the tradition of taking down their Christmas tree, wreath, and other festive adornments around the feast of the Epiphany on 6th January, when Christians celebrate the arrival of the Magi in Bethlehem to visit the infant Jesus.

Back in 2021 however, English Heritage encouraged the public to follow the medieval tradition of leaving their decorations up all the way until 2nd February, and the feast of Candlemas. We thought about it in our household, but were not sure that our tree would last quite that long.

Leaving the Christmas decorations up all that time came about as a tradition all those years ago because Candlemas signals the end of the Christian celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany. The feast centres around the final episode of Jesus' infancy in St Luke's Gospel, when Jesus' parents Mary and Joseph take their baby to the Temple in Jerusalem. While they are there, they encounter two people, Simeon and Anna: between them they tell Mary and Joseph extraordinary things about their child, how He will do remarkable things and bring great joy to many, but how there will also be profound sadness on the way too. It is a mysterious, bittersweet moment, even now when hearing the passage read aloud in a church service.

I find this moment of prophecy for Jesus' life remarkably resonant for the journeys of us all, and it feels particularly apposite to hear it early on in the calendar year. Just like Mary, Joseph, and Jesus Himself, our lives will always contain moments that bring us gladness and delight, and other times that bring us pain and sorrow.

Those painful times can leave us feeling terribly alone or bewildered, not least because our griefs or troubles are always very much ours. And so just as our experiences of them are very individual, so too are the ways in which we might respond and cope with such times of challenge.

Something that many of us who follow Christ cling to amidst the storms of life is the knowledge that this pattern of both wonderful joys and deep sorrows is one that Jesus, God the Son, has Himself shared. This means we have a God who takes all of our celebrations and our anguishes seriously, because He has made His way through this world too. As many of us sang at Christmas, 'And He feeleth for our sadness, and He shareth in our gladness.' So whatever we go through, we can take it all to God, knowing that it matters to Him, and that He offers His love and care to us in any and every situation.

I hope that 2025 will bring you far more joys than anything else; but whatever this year brings, may you know God's presence and His peace throughout it all. As always, you will all be very much in my prayers.

Choosing to be married in a church is about so much more than choosing venue, because a Christian а wedding brings with it so many important dimensions. The service the wonderful frames act of committing oneself to another within the incomparable love of God. In the service, the couple are prayed for, and receive encouragement and blessings. They commit themselves to one another in the same spot,

using the same words, as thousands of others before them. They are given support and guidance by their parish priest in the build-up to the big day, to help them prepare both practically and pastorally. And by getting married in a church, that church becomes for that couple a special place to which they can return again and again, with a community there who will be delighted to welcome and support them.

Choosing to marry in a church, then, is about so much more than your wedding: it's about your marriage.

To marry in any given Church of England church, a couple must have what is called a 'qualifying connection' to that church; there are many such connections, primarily including living in the parish, having lived in the parish in the past, or being recently descended from those who married here.

Report on meeting of the PCC 4th December 2024

At the December meeting of the PCC, the main item for consideration was our charitable giving. A few nominations had been received, and the PCC discussed the importance of balancing parish giving between local charities and those with a wider scope. It was decided to support the following eight charities: Mind over Mountains, Wycombe Youth for Christ, Bucks Historic Churches, Baby Unit Relatives Care and Support at Stoke Mandeville, Lighthouse, Ebony Horse Club, Whitechapel Mission.

Since the meeting, routine checks on the ceiling in St Dunstan's have confirmed that no work is necessary. Work on the south wall at Owlswick is ongoing, and work is also due to be done on the Altar Frontal at St Dunstan's. Various options include professionally cleaning, repairing and adapting the current one, or having a new one made. The PCC will discuss these options over the next few months.

Ted Kent and Jane Curry, our two Deanery Synod representatives, spoke about the continued need for representation from our parish. If anyone is interested, please do speak to Jane or Ted – being a Deanery Synod representative means that one is an ex officio member of the PCC if not already elected onto the PCC.

The date of the APCM has been fixed for Sunday 23rd March, at 3:45pm (straight after evensong), and the next meeting of the PCC is on 12th March.

On the first Sunday of the month, we join the congregation for the family service at 10.00 am.



Electoral Roll Renewal

Every six years, each parish church is required to form a completely new Electoral Roll, as required under the Church Representation Rules. This year, 2025, is a year for such a renewal.

This means that our church's electoral roll will start afresh from scratch. **Everyone who** wishes to be included on the new Roll, whether they are on the present roll or not, must complete and return a signed application form between 17th February and 2nd March 2025.

Under the Church Representation Rules any lay persons are entitled to have their names entered on the Roll, if they:

(i) are baptised and aged 16 or over;

(ii) have signed a form of application for enrolment;

and either

(iii) are members of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the Church of England being resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the six months prior to the application for enrolment;

or;

(iv) are members in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the Church of England) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity declaring themselves to be also members of the Church of England and having habitually attended public worship in the parish during the period of six months prior to enrolment.

Forms will be available in the church, or via the parish website, in due course. Completed and signed forms should be returned **from 17th February and no later than 2nd March** to the Electoral Roll Officer Mrs Caroline Godden at The Rectory, Mill Lane, Monks Risborough, HP27 9JE, or electronically to

electoralroll@stdunstanschurch.com.

Walkers could lose 40,000 miles of footpaths

Walkers in Britain could stand to lose thousands of miles of rights of way, because of the sheer size of the growing backlog of applications for footpaths to be recognised and protected.

The Government has set a deadline of 2031 for public footpaths and bridleways to be officially mapped. But local authorities still have nearly 8,000 applications waiting to be processed. This has caused concern that some rights of way could be lost forever.

The Ramblers, the walking charity, reckons there are about 41,628 miles of missing rights of way. They are encouraging people to track these down, in their *Don't Lose Your Way* campaign.



Class entries

Year 3 have been learning about Buckinghamshire and reading the BFG by Roald Dahl and produced some lovely writing all about inhabited giant country.

'Giant country is a very strange land far, far away from the UK. The land is inhabited by giants and there is one friendly giant, the one and only BFG! In the country, the landscape is like nowhere on earth! The desolate ground is a dusty shade of pale yellow. The sky is as red as blood with a constant wind like a giant breathing. The background has a humongous craggy mountain with the most gloomiest cave on this planet (I mean giant country.)

In Giant Country the giants are big bloodbottleling bruts, except one, the one and only BFG! The BFG lives in a cave with the other giants like bender around deep forests and rushing rivers.

All About Giant Country - Giant Country is a country very far away from the UK. In Giant Country lots of giants live there. There is nothing like you would see on earth. Chapter Two

In the last *Newsletter* you saw this frail young man Guidobaldo da Montefeltro (1472-1526) aged 5, leaning against his father, Duke Federico of Urbino. The Duke died 5 years later, so his only son Guidobaldo inherited the dukedom aged 10.

Pope Sixtus had his eyes on Urbino to become a Papal State, so pressure was on the boy Duke to have an heir to secure his dukedom. Thus in 1488, aged 16, he married 17-year-old Elisabetta Gonzaga (1471-1526), daughter of the Marquis of Mantua. Elisabetta, who, like all Renaissance noblewomen, had been highly educated with her brothers.

Alas there was no heir, because Guidobaldo developed gout before he was 20 and was in constant terrible pain, which worsened until he could neither stand or walk. Duchess Elisabetta, who remained devoted to Guidobaldo, reigned at the resplendent Court of Urbino. Contemporary accounts report that she was a very great, refined and elegant noblewoman, talented and courageous, with a lively wit. Her inherited Court was dazzling, its Palace built for Guidobaldo's father acclaimed as the most beautiful in Italy, its chief artistic and intellectual centre. It was adorned with treasures, walls hung with cloths of gold and silver, with countless objects of marble and bronze, rare paintings, every kind of musical instrument : everything rare and outstanding.

The Ducal library had choice and exquisite manuscripts in Greek, Latin and Hebrew, which resident scribes and illuminators had embellished in gold and silver. The most brilliant scholars and inventors in Italy lived at court.

In 1502 Duke Guidobaldo commissioned a local Urbino-born artist to paint his and Duchess Elisabetta's portraits: none other than Raphael (1483-1520), two years before he moved to Florence, where his art was to be completely transformed by studying the work of Michelangelo and Leonardo. All three of them were in Florence in 1505.

Guidobaldo and Elisabetta are shown in rigid frontal poses, wearing the Montefeltro heraldic colours of black and gold. Guidobaldo wears a black velvet cloak with silver buttons, edged in gold and black chequers. From the window behind him we see a landscape of farmland, a river and a walled city. Elisabetta's portrait, too, has a landscape background, possibly the mountainous Urbino countryside. She wears two chains and a scorpion jewel on her forehead, an astrological good luck charm linked to fertility. Her black dress is decorated with asymmetrical gold oblongs. Most fascinating to a nerd like me are the Arabic letters embroidered on the ribbon border of her neckline, which could suggest that the ducal library contained Arabic manuscripts. Greek manuscripts sometimes had to be translated from Arabic, because Arabic scholars had found and translated Greek manuscripts before anyone else.

Glorious Urbino Court life was halted when Guidobaldo died without an heir aged 35. Duchess Elisabetta became Regent to their young adopted (in 1504) heir Francesco, Guidobaldo's nephew from one of his 8 sisters, Giovanna, who had been placed in marriage into the Papal della Rovere family. Thus the boy Francesco was also a nephew of Pope

Julius II, who ensured that the boy became Duke of Urbino and Captain General of the Papal States.

When Francesco came of age in 1516, Elisabetta was expelled from Urbino by the then Pope, Leo X, and she died penniless at her refuge in Ferrara. Urbino passed into the Papal family, which had been their plan all along.

However, Duchess Elisabetta was eulogised by still extant contemporary accounts, and here both are immortalised by Raphael.

Working through the seasons at Whiteleaf

I am lucky enough to be the Site Coordinator for the Chiltern Society joint sites of Whiteleaf and Brush Hill, with the job of organising an amazing group of volunteers to tackle the seemingly endless work needed to keep both sites under control. The work we do is divided between regular, seasonal tasks and ad hoc jobs in response to events or as one-off projects.

Here is a flavour of the work we have been involved in this year.

During the spring we continued to tackle the effects of ash die back by clearing dead trees from along footpaths, opening up shaded areas and creating more dead hedges. If you visit the sites, you may notice our work along the footpath from the back of Whiteleaf hill down towards the golf club.

Spring is also the time of year to tackle site maintenance jobs in preparation for school holidays and increased visitors. Visitors using the car park hopefully noticed we filled in the largest potholes and also erected some signs to designate disabled parking and to ensure the emergency vehicle access onto the hill is not blocked. The picnic area also had its first mow and rake of the year.

A new bench was installed to make the most of the view at the top of Brush Hill - do go and try it out on a clear day.

As everything sprang into life, we also started our regular summer footpath clearing. This ensures the nettles, brambles, hogweed and overhanging branches don't encroach around information boards, by gates and along paths and spoil the experience for our visitors- large, small, canine and equine!

Another regular summer job is weeding Whiteleaf cross. Our work on the cross is always weather dependent as, being on a steep chalk slope, it is treacherous underfoot when it's wet and not safe to work on. Fortunately, the weather for our June and July work parties was ideal and around a dozen people set to work each month with hoes to lightly scrape off the surface weeds and expose the white chalk underneath. It's a painstaking job, which isn't everyone's favourite, but the results are well worth it, even if they only last for a short time.

With August came the annual job of pulling golden rod. Solidago, as it is also known, is a yellow, decorative plant often found in walled gardens and flower arrangements. However, it has no place on Whiteleaf hill and is considered an invasive species. August is the best time for this job as the yellow flower of the plant makes it easily visible and we can pull it before it dries and spreads its seeds far and wide for another year. Around 15 volunteers braved a scorching morning in full sun to tackle this. We

had to admit defeat at coffee time, having worked for an hour and a half, as the mercury climbed towards 30 degrees which meant we had to stop work.

Our regular, seasonal work for the summer includes lots of brush cutting (with hand held machinery) and raking (by hand!), once the wild flowers on Whiteleaf hill have finished. This encourages them to grow again next year. As we have such a large area to cut and rake, we rely on other Chiltern Society groups to help us, as we need to get it done as soon as possible after the flowers have finished, ideally during August, but certainly by the end of September.

As everything grew so late this year, our 'window of opportunity' was smaller than in previous years and most of the cutting took place in September, including an early start for 5 brush cutters in the mist and rain at September's work party (what a contrast to August!) rewarded later by the Volunteers' thank you' pizza party.

The Autumn and early Winter work parties brought the usual round of scrub clearing (with the help of brush cutters) and clearing brambles, branches, etc. by hand in areas around footpaths, entrances and the cross-ridge dyke (a late bronze age feature some 3,000+ years old which is a scheduled ancient monument and crosses the footpath onto Whiteleaf Hill).

We have our work parties on the first Thursday morning of each month, so if you see us do come along and say hello. We couldn't continue the work we do across the Chilterns without the support of local people.
