# The Rev'd Sally Prendergast writes:

I achieved something delightful and astonishing recently. I made over 3471 people laugh - and counting, as I type!

I posted something really trivial on social media, and it clearly hit the spot; not only did thousands of people take the time to read my post, but almost 2000 of them decided to comment beneath it.

What extraordinary subject matter was I tackling?

Fish finger butties (I told you it was trivial)!

My husband Patrick wanted one for lunch, and to my horror he refused ketchup and opted for mayonnaise - with butter. He then cut it on a skewed diagonal! We joked and laughed about it as we pottered in the kitchen together.

Seeing the entertainment value of the situation, I took to Facebook to share our lunchtime banter in the 'Dull Men's Club' (open to others). The string of comments grew and grew, with endless opinions about the choice of sauce, bread (brown or white, toasted or untoasted), the direction of cut, and choice of additions such as cheese, vinegar, lettuce, and tartare sauce. We had a good giggle reading through the comments, mostly from people who clearly understood our banter and embraced the silliness.

The following morning, the comments had exploded as America had caught up with the fun overnight. They knew nothing about the tradition of the Great British fish finger, and had no concept of a butty, and translation was required.

This world is full of distress, tragedy and conflict, and we need to hone our coping skills to deal with it all. I firmly believe that God gave us the gift of laughter to break into our hearts, not because we should turn a blind eye and stop caring about the sadness of the world, but because we need to rest from it periodically.

Laughter is healing; it boosts our immune system, reduces stress hormones, relaxes us, reduces pain, and can prevent illness. It boosts our mood and if it's a shared experience, it improves social bonds and enhances relationships. There's plenty of humour in the Bible - my favourite is the time Paul preached late into the night until a young man called Eutychus dozed off on a windowsill and fell three storeys to the ground - he died but was resurrected (Acts 20). Then there's the account of Balaam's talking donkey (Numbers 22)!

Yes, there's comfort to be found in the familiar (ketchup, white bread, cut straight across middle with two fish fingers on each side, obviously) but there's also much to gain from experimenting and approaching things afresh. We need to feed our minds as much as our bodies, to explore, be curious and playful, and to have fun doing so, in order to have the resilience, strength and patience to step out and make the world a kinder, more peaceful place.

# Report of the PCC Meeting on 27th May 2025

The new PCC met for the first time on 27<sup>th</sup> May, a slightly smaller gathering due to some Half Term absentees. At each meeting, members of the PCC consider a safeguarding scenario, and discuss some actions that should be taken. Safeguarding is not just the responsibility of our Safeguarding Officer. Indeed, as charitable trustees, all members of the PCC must ensure that safeguarding requirements are complied with, so this type of exercise is very useful. It was noted that there is a new nationwide statutory requirement for all bell ringers to do some basic safeguarding awareness training.

A couple of topics under discussion regarding the fabric of the church were the church alarm and internet connection in the church. No final decisions were made, but some members of the PCC have been tasked to explore various options.

Following a detailed report and presentation on the St Dunstan's church organ to the PCC in August 2024, a shortlist of options was produced. Subsequent further investigation has enabled the Organ Working Group to recommend a preferred solution, and supplier for the project. The PCC was asked to review this proposal and confirm the planned next steps. Following some discussion of the timings, costs, and practical implications, the PCC agreed that the Organ Working Group should seek a detailed final proposal from a hybrid organ supplier. Further details of this will be shared in due course.

There are many varied and wonderful events coming up in the church calendar, and at the time of writing this report, the annual Bucks Art Week has just come to a close. All these events could not happen without the willingness, time and generosity of those who run them, and a particular word of thanks should go to the Events team. Speaker evenings at Owlswick are also a wonderful opportunity to hear members of the community talk about particular interests or skills.

The condition of Rev'd Peter Godden's cassock might not have gone unnoticed – fraying hems, missing buttons – and the PCC agreed to fund a new cassock, which we look forward to seeing on his return from his sabbatical.

Finally, the cleaning of the church was discussed. If anyone would consider volunteering for an hour or two on a regular basis, please speak to the churchwardens.


#### Small grants for local students or apprentices

# A wake up call to the world

#### By The Rt Hon Baroness Theresa May of Maidenhead

If you stop to ask anyone in the street about slavery they would probably tell you it was abolished hundreds of years ago. After all, in the UK the Abolition of the Slave Trade Act of 1807 made it illegal to trade in enslaved people across the British Empire and in 1833 the Abolition of Slavery Act ended the use of enslaved labour.

More than that, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights adopted in December 1948 states clearly that 'No one shall be held in slavery or servitude; slavery and the slave trade shall be prohibited in all their forms'. Yet today it is estimated that there are 50 million people in slavery of one form or another around the world. It is happening in every country including the UK. All too often it is hidden in plain sight.

We may speak of victims and survivors, but these are not just victims and survivors, they are individuals. Each one of them has a personality and hopes and dreams which have been cruelly shattered by those who make a profit from them. The slave drivers and traffickers buy and sell people as commodities, whose only value is in the profit they generate.

Scooped up from towns and villages to satisfy the personal or commercial interests of the slave drivers, their freedom is cruelly torn from them; they are deprived of their dignity, dehumanised and thrust into a life of misery.

Sadly, vulnerability to modern slavery and human trafficking is increasing. Climate change, conflict, migration and poverty lead to vulnerability to being taken into slavery and/or trafficked into exploitation.

This is a moral stain on our humanity. Modern slavery and human trafficking is the greatest human rights issue of our time. If we are going to end this degrading and inhumane activity, to give people back their freedom and the right to make choices over their own lives we need to act and we need to act now.

After I stepped down from No 10, I worked to establish the Global Commission on Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking which I Chair. On 8 April at the headquarters of the United Nations (UN) in New York we launched our report with recommendations to the UN, governments, businesses and civil society organisations. The report can be found on the Commission's website

This report is a wake-up call to the world. It challenges governments, businesses and civil society to recognise the prevalence of modern slavery and human trafficking and to understand their responsibility to act. We can reduce the number of people in slavery around the world, but to do so we must all play our part, including the public. The report is a Call to Action to us all.

#### What Goes Around Comes Around

Many of we baby boomers, born in the late nineteen forties and early fifties, have grandchildren, who regularly tell us about the latest initiative to save the planet. But do we have much to learn from these Greta Thunberg wannabees? Apparently not much, as we have seen most of it before.

For instance, take reuse and recycling. Milk was always delivered in bottles. No single use plastic jugs or Tetrapak cartons for us. These bottles were collected by the milkman and reused an average of thirty times before being crushed and recycled. Bottles for beer and soft drinks carried deposits and were always returned to the supplier for reuse. Newspaper recycling is nothing new either, and the Scouts raised funds by collecting large quantities of newsprint and selling it directly to the recyclers. Even jam jars were reusable. My junior school made an annual spring jam jar collection and we boys walked miles collecting jars, which were then sold back to the manufacturers for washing and reuse. It would have been no use trying to do this in autumn however, as many households used the jars for homemade jam made from foraged fruit. The rag and bone man, often using a horse drawn cart, collected scrap metal and old clothes. The metal was melted for scrap and the clothes sorted into reusable items, cotton and woollen rags. Cotton was processed for paper making, thus reducing our dependence on imported wood chips. Wool was either re-spun into yarn for reweaving or made into wadding for the furniture industry. The car industry today makes a fuss about the recyclability of its products, but car parts have always been recycled. If your family was lucky enough to have a family car and it needed parts, then a Saturday morning spent at the local breakers' yard stripping off a wing or even an engine was the way to go.

We had no single use plastic food packaging and in fact, most grocery stores bought their products in bulk and weighed them out into paper bags as required. Sweets came loose in large jars, biscuits in reusable tins, butter in barrels and flour in sacks. We wrapped our sandwiches in grease-proof paper and carried them in a metal sandwich box. If we wanted a hot drink at work you could forget the single use coffee cup. We usually had our own mug and often provided our own coffee or tea, loose of course. No plastic coffee modules or tea bags for us. If we needed water for exercise or sport, we carried an aluminium water bottle and filled it from the tap. Anyone asking to buy a bottle of water would have been laughed out of the shop. Fast food was usually fish and chips, which were wrapped in paper with a couple of layers of newspaper for insulation. The greasy paper was not much use for recycling, but made a good firelighter the next morning.

When it came to getting around, we left a very small carbon footprint. We walked or cycled to school or if we were very lucky took the bus. No school run in a gas-guzzling 4x4 for us. Since the invention of the motor car, there have always been electric vehicles. The batteries have just got smaller. In 1919, Harrods introduced battery electric delivery vans in London and their last electric van came out of service in 1970 when it was donated to a museum. Today Google and Ocado are experimenting with electric vans, which look very similar to the 1930 Harrods model. The milkman made the transition from horse and cart to electric floats in the 1940s and until fairly recently, Wren Davis in Prestwood still used electric floats for milk

delivery. Many cities used electric buses in their city centres, which were powered from overhead lines giving them infinite range, unlike today's battery powered buses, that will need recharging at bus stops. Cities such as Manchester, Croydon and Birmingham have introduced tram systems to reduce city centre pollution. Actually they have reintroduced trams as the original vehicles were taken out of service in the 1960s and Blackpool never did give up on its seafront trams.

All this begs the question, "What's new?" Solar voltaic electricity generation is certainly new, although solar water heating is as old as mankind. Wind power is certainly not new, but to use it to generate electricity is, although hydro-electric power goes back to Edwardian times. Awareness of the issues facing us today is a new phenomenon. Post war prosperity made us pleased to be able to be wasteful and to use the new plastics. So, the next time your grandchild tells you how to save the planet, you can say, "Yes, I know".

# **Food for Thought**



Christ in the House of Martha and Mary 160x142 cm c1655 Johannes Vermeer 1632-75 National Gallery of Scotland

I feel sorry for Martha. She had invited Jesus into her home and whilst her sister Mary sat at Jesus' feet listening to Him, Martha did all the work. She asked Jesus to tell Mary to help her, but Jesus chided her for being too busy and fretful, praising Mary for just listening. (Luke 10: 38-42).

Here, Martha brings bread in a basket, for she could hardly invite a guest and offer him nothing. The bread is in the centre of the top half of the painting, perhaps referring to Jesus' later words (Luke 22:19) at the Last Supper calling bread His body.

This is Vermeer's only biblical painting, but it looks more Italian than Dutch. It is huge with more than life-size figures painted with a vivacious bravura completely uncharacteristic of Vermeer's later small still interiors. It is so large that it must have been a commission, perhaps as an altarpiece, in a Catholic church as Dutch Calvinist churches are unadorned.

The composition is simple: Mary sits on a stool right in our space, and, if this is an altarpiece, her bare feet at eye-level. We look up from her to Martha, who speaks to Jesus, who points us back to Mary. There are large areas of swiftly-painted clothes with dramatic folds in alternating blocks of light and shadow, perhaps for the congregation to 'read' at a distance. Patterning is restricted to the bold table-carpet design and stripes on Mary's delectably painted head-cloth and twisted belt. Jesus has a spiky aureole of light around His head, like a ghostly foretelling of the crown of thorns. His face is lit, whilst Martha's is half in shadow and Mary's profile is startlingly outlined against the tablecloth which is as pristine as an altar covering.

The colours fall into three diagonal bands: the bottom third dramatically dark green and blue, above which is a middle band of cream, orange and Mary's possibly symbolic sacrificial-blood-red blouse at which Jesus points. A mid-tone orange-brown where a door and beams can be discerned sets the scene in a modest interior.

This is an early work painted when Vermeer was about twenty-three, married for two years to Catharina Bolnes (1633-87), beginning their family of fifteen children in twenty-two years, eleven of whom survived. Vermeer had inherited his parents' businesses of inn-keeping and picture-dealing and he was considered an expert in Italian painting.

More importantly his mother-in-law Maria Thins (1593-1680), with whom the family lived, owned a collection of paintings by the Dutch Italianate school, the *Caravaggisti*, so-called because they had been transfixed by Caravaggio's (1573-1610) paintings in Rome, where they had lived. There was a group of *Caravaggisti* in Utrecht in the 1650s and this painting is very like their work. Sometimes Vermeer featured Maria Thin's paintings on the back walls of his painted interiors.

Maria Thins was a fervent Catholic and Vermeer a baptised Protestant, so this painting may refer to the theological dispute about the active or earthly life (Martha) versus the contemplative or spiritual existence (Mary). To Catholics salvation came through faith and good works, such as feeding the hungry, whereas Protestants believed that it came through faith alone, not good works.

Although I feel sorry for Martha, I bet Jesus ate her bread.

# Those long car journeys of summer...

Are you taking a LONG car journey as part of your holiday this summer? Beware: hours on the road can leave you tired, a bit travel sick and with aching muscles.

Tiredness is the most serious – at least if you are the driver! It is reckoned that 10 - 20 percent of all car crashes are due to sleepy drivers. So, try and get enough sleep the night before, as research in Queensland, Australia has shown that drivers with less than five hours sleep are just as likely to crash as if they were over the legal limit for alcohol. Motion sickness can be another hassle - and it affects around one in three of us. Though curiously enough, drivers hardly ever suffer from carsickness - just the passengers.

Gut discomfort is another problem - on long car trips we tend to drink less, go to the toilet less, snack at odd times on junk food, and not move for hours. No wonder we feel sluggish and bloated.

So – when you stop for regular breaks, take the trouble to walk about. Drink plenty of water, and eat healthy snacks like bananas, apples and nuts.

Finally, avoid tight clothes on a long trip. They only put extra pressure on your abdomen. Instead, opt for loose-fitting trousers or skirts which have some 'give' around your tummy.

# Why can I see the moon in the day?

It's holiday time, and you may be spending more time than usual with your children. That will give them ample opportunity to ask you those questions for which you have no answer. A survey has found the top ten questions that most stump parents are:

Why is the moon sometimes out in the day? Why is the sky blue? Will we ever discover aliens? How much does the Earth weigh? How do aeroplanes stay in the air? Why is water wet? How do I do long division? Where do birds and bees go in the winter? What makes a rainbow? Why are there different times on earth?




