Aim and purposes

The PCC has the responsibility to promote, both in the parish and throughout the Risborough Team, the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England, and to co-operate with the minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It has responsibility for the maintenance of St Dunstan's Church, the church hall and churchyard, and the Chapel of Ease of St Peter at Owlswick. It must also ensure that appropriate safeguarding and health and safety procedures are in place. The Team Vicar is commissioned to minister both within the parish, and throughout the Risborough Team.

Objectives and Activities

Throughout 2025, we offered worship, ran community groups, and held events which continued to strengthen the life of the church in the midst of the community that we serve.

The Eucharist is our central act of worship, with full use made of the seasonal range of liturgical material for Holy Communion from Common Worship (CW) produced by The Church of England. Services of Holy Communion and Evensong according to the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) also form a core part of the life of the worshipping community.

The pattern of services typically follows this pattern (all services are at St Dunstan's unless specified):

First Sunday of the month:	8am BCP Holy Communion 10am CW All-Age Holy Communion 3pm (Winter) / 6pm (Summer) BCP Evensong
Second Sunday of the month:	9am BCP Holy Communion (St Peter's Owlswick) 10am CW Holy Communion 3pm (Winter) / 6pm (Summer) BCP Evensong
Third & Fifth Sunday of the month:	10am CW Holy Communion 3pm (Winter) / 6pm (Summer) BCP Evensong
Fourth Sunday of the month:	10am CW Holy Communion 3pm (Winter) / 6pm (Summer) BCP Evensong (St Peter's Owlswick)
Every Thursday:	9.30am CW Holy Communion

Additional services are held for the major feasts of the Church year.

Groups such as the Choir, the Bell Ringers, and the Flower Team brought people together in enhancing the worshipping life of the church. Activities such as the Fellowship Group, Friendship Group, and the Lunch Club enabled the church to provide a pastoral presence for the local community.

The PCC aims to donate a percentage of its income to charitable causes. The financial viability of this is discussed in the context of the PCC's finances towards the end of the year, and then a proposal is made and voted on regarding how much and to whom the PCC should donate.

Achievements and Performance

Attendance at both Sunday and midweek services was healthy and steady throughout the year. The month of October – commonly taken to be a good barometer for typical church attendance levels – saw an average of attendance of 76 adults and 6 children across the various Sunday services. The midweek eucharist attracts an average of 8 attendees.

We welcomed both regular and occasional worshippers to services at our major festivals. In March, 153 people attended either the Easter Vigil or one of the Easter Day services at St Dunstan's, with 97 people receiving Holy Communion. At Christmas, 534 people attended worship across our five services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, with 117 people receiving Holy Communion. The Village Carol Service was once again the most well-attended service of the year, with 246 people attending, most of whom are not regular worshippers at St Dunstan's. A further 95 people attended Nine Lessons and Carols at St Dunstan's on the fourth Sunday of Advent, and St Peter's Chapel welcomed 47 people for the Owlswick Carol Service there earlier on the same day.

During the year one child was baptized; three couples were married, and another came for a thanksgiving service to mark their tenth wedding anniversary; we held eleven funerals in St Dunstan's Church (nine of which were followed immediately by a burial in the churchyard) and one funeral at St Peter's Chapel; ministers conducted three additional funerals at crematoria or in other parish churches on behalf of St Dunstan's; there were a further fourteen interments of ashes in the churchyard, and three memorial services were held in St Dunstan's (one of which followed a service conducted at a crematorium, and one of which included one of the interments referred to above).

Groups such as the 10 o'clock Club (Sunday School) and the Lunch Club continued their activities, bringing in both junior and senior members of the community. St Dunstan's church once again hosted exhibitors for Bucks Art Week, and was the setting for a number of concerts which represented a lively and varied programme of musical offerings.

During the season of Advent, the Advent Craft Fair and the Chinnor Silver Band Concert were both held in the church, both of which brought many people into St Dunstan's who would not normally be there.

Financial Review

The church's total income this year was £112,048, whilst our total expenditure was £110,078 such that we recorded a net surplus for the year of £1,970. Our income was lower than last year's by £10,262 whereas our expenditure was £562 higher.

Two legacies and a significant donation to the organ fund that were received in 2024 together explain most of the fall in income from last year to this. The largest single element of our income this year came again from parishioners' donations, many of which were gift aided. Gift aided donations were some £3,000 higher than in 2024. However gift aid recovered this year, which was from donations received in the 2024/5 tax year, was around £4,000 lower than that recovered last year on donations received in 2023/4. Many thanks are due to Nick Tyler for the work he continues to put into recovering gift aid on eligible donations.

The church's various fund-raising activities again made a significant contribution to our income, raising nearly £22,500 in total, for which thanks go to all involved whether organising or participating in these events.

Expenditure on church activities was around £7,000 higher than last year. The £9,500 cost of the repair works to St Peter's chapel, paid early this year from restricted funds, was only partly offset by the cost of churchyard maintenance being around £1,000 lower than last year.

This year we again paid our full parish share contribution to the Diocese. When it became clear that the surplus of income over expenditure this year would be much smaller than last year's, in order to avoid a deficit for the year the PCC chose to reduce the amount we gave to charities to approximately 5% of our net free income.

We have learned that the parish share we pay the diocese will be over £6,600 higher in 2026 than it was in 2025. This is due to a number of factors including the culmination of a grant that previously lowered parish shares across Aylesbury Deanery, general inflation, clergy stipends increasing in line with the rise in cost of living and the increase in our own electoral roll.

The PCC is considering what steps we need to take to ensure that this increased parish share does not cause us to fall into deficit in 2026.

I am delighted that Ann Preston has again very kindly agreed to serve as independent examiner of our accounts. Many thanks go to Ann for her diligent, and demanding, examination of our accounts. Her work is greatly appreciated.

Reserves Policy

The Reserves Policy is that the church should maintain sufficient net free reserves, that is neither restricted nor designated funds, to cover at least 3 months' expenditure on normal running costs as well as any forecast expenditure on committed capital projects.

At the end of 2025, free reserves stood at £47,047. Three months' normal running costs amount to around £27,000. We do not currently foresee any major repair and maintenance work during 2026, but of course we cannot rule out such work unexpectedly becoming necessary. Further, as noted below, we now anticipate but are not yet committed to significant expenditure on a project to renew and enhance the organ at St Dunstan's. With those caveats, I am happy to report that our reserves remain compliant with the Reserves Policy.

Plans for the Future

A glimpse of plans for 2026 include:

- Continuing to enhance our celebration of key festivals throughout the church year.
- Nurturing new members of the congregation in their faith.
- Helping young members of the congregation grow in their understanding of and participation in our worship.
- Ensuring smooth transitions for those departing from or stepping in to new roles.
- Continuing work on a project to restore and enhance the church organ.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is a corporate body established by the Church of England and operating under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure. The PCC is a charity registered under the full title of THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF THE ECCLESIASTICAL PARISH OF ST DUNSTAN, MONKS RISBOROUGH (No 1153869). Members of the PCC are the trustees of the charity. The PCC met for seven full meetings during the year.

The method and appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. The Team Vicar, Assistant Curate and Churchwardens are ex officio members of the PCC.

Meetings are occasionally preceded by a Standing Committee meeting, with the Standing Committee having the power to transact the business of the PCC between PCC meetings, subject to any directions given by the PCC, and to undergo preparatory work on behalf of the PCC ahead of full Council meetings. The Standing Committee comprises the Team Vicar, Assistant Curate, Churchwardens, Treasurer, and PCC Secretary.

A full renewal of the electoral roll was conducted, after which the number of parishioners on the church electoral roll for 2025 was 147 (compared with 139 in 2024).

The Incumbent and Churchwardens are also trustees of Hody's Charity: a small charity established by a previous incumbent of the parish, and which offers young people from the parish support with education.

Administrative Information

The parish of Monks Risborough with Owlswick centres around two places of worship: St. Dunstan's Church, in the village of Monks Risborough; and St. Peter's Chapel in the hamlet of Owlswick. The parish forms part of the Risborough Team Ministry, in the Buckingham area of the Diocese of Oxford, within the Church of England.

St. Dunstan's Church is situated on Mill Lane, Monks Risborough, HP27 9JF.

St. Peter's Chapel is situated at Owlswick, Princes Risborough, HP27 9RH.

The church's trustees, the PCC, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 (the Act).



Vicar's Annual Report

Early in 2025 St Dunstan's was the host church for the Churches Together in Risborough Service for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, which served to start the year with a special reminder that we are part of God's universal Church, all called to play our part in sharing His light throughout our community. This is something that we as the body of Christ in St Dunstan's faithfully do throughout the year: in everything from our funeral ministry to our weddings; our Play Days to our groups providing fellowship; our presence at large public occasions to one-to-one pastoral support, we make God's love and goodness known throughout this parish.

The year continued with the arrival of Lent, during which we had a large number participate in our Lent Groups. Many people too responded to the invitation to journey through Holy Week, which is a unique opportunity in the church year to grow in the understanding of the extent of Christ's love for us. As ever, Easter was a joyful occasion and was marked in four services across St Dunstan's and St Peter's.

Easter season brought with it all three of our weddings this year, which all took place within the space of a month. Also in that season came the 80th anniversary of VE Day, marked with a service of Choral Evensong at which we gave thanks for the peace that we have enjoyed as a result, and prayed for peace to abound not just on these shores but across Europe and beyond. I was privileged to be asked to speak at a beacon lighting ceremony held in the Stratton Memorial Garden later that same day, and was reminded of what a privilege it is that representatives of the Christian faith can be asked to bring God's word into such civic occasions. Towards the end of the season of Easter came Ascension Day, which is always one of the most beautiful and memorable liturgies of the year.

As Christians we are called to be a family – to be brothers and sisters in Christ – and as such, we share both the highs and the lows together. Many of us joined in with the festivities for our Patronal festival, which as always was a splendid occasion. We also supported one another in harder times – not least when we commended much-loved members of our congregation to God's eternal rest. Being a parish church, we supported many people from beyond our congregation through times of grief, with dozens of funerals, burials, and memorial services held throughout the year.

Over the summer months I took advantage of the opportunity offered to clergy after ten years of ministry to undertake a sabbatical, for retreat, study, and rest. I took the chance to undertake theological study of literary figures and their works, some of the fruits of which I will share in a sermon series in early summer of 2026. I could not have taken this opportunity without the encouragement of so many of you in the parish. My thanks go to all those who were willing to step up to take on additional responsibilities during that time, of which there were a great many of you, but especially Sally, and Sue and Christopher our churchwardens, who did so much over those three months.

The year continued apace with holy days, concerts, fellowship events, activities for families, and more. As we moved towards December I led the Tree of Light service in the centre of Princes Risborough, which meant another opportunity to share the light of Christ with the community. It was very good to be able to address so many people on such a special occasion. We also hosted another Churches Together service – this time heralding the start of Advent

Through Advent and at Christmastide we welcomed many people into St Dunstan's who would not normally be here. The number of people attending St Dunstan's during this period was significantly up on the previous year – so much so that at the Village Carol Service we had people seated around

the high altar, and had to deploy patio furniture to ensure everyone had a seat. As many of you have heard me say before, church is emphatically not about the numbers – a size of a congregation is no indication of faithfulness – but nonetheless it is undoubtedly a good thing that so many people in this community came and heard the good news of Christ's birth proclaimed to them.

This is of course just a small snapshot of all that has taken place in the life of our church community in the last year, and I hope that you enjoy reading the reports that follow which will give a greater insight into all that has happened during the past twelve months.

Amidst our reflections on the past year, I hope that we can all remember what a church is – it is not the building, nor an abstract, unseen hierarchy: it is each and every one of us who gathers together in Christ's name. And it is us as Christ's Church who make all of this shared life, and much more besides, possible. So may I take this opportunity to say how profoundly grateful I am for what so many of you do by way of giving your time, effort, and gifts to serve Christ in this place. So thank you to: our clergy; those who served as churchwardens, financial officers, secretary, and on the PCC during the year; the events team and those who supported them; organists and choir members; 10 o'clock Club and Play Day leaders; Lunch Club and coffee rota volunteers; sidespeople and the sacristan & linen team; flower arrangers and cleaners; churchyard workers and the newsletter team; and many, many more of you who do things both regularly and occasionally, too numerous to mention. Thank you for all that you do in making St Dunstan's a place where the love of Christ is proclaimed in word and deed – and may we continue to serve Him joyfully in the year to come.

Churchwarden Report including Fabric

Introduction

2025 at St Dunstan's was a relatively uneventful year from a churchwarden's perspective. It was characterised chiefly by surveys and rodent activity.

Electrical action

Various required items of electrical work have been undertaken. Amongst these, a particularly noticeable item is the North wall flood light, which has received some remedial work and now comes on at dusk and goes off at 01:00hrs. Of the three light switches in the south porch, the two that should remain in the on position have been taped over to try to prevent them being switched off.

Rodent activity and past control

Debris has been regularly appearing on the first two pews against the north wall. Pest controllers were engaged in the summer to try to eradicate the probable rodents causing the problem. Initially it was thought to be due to Glis Glis activity. It is uncertain as to whether one of them was trapped or not. The fact that the problem has continued into the normal hibernation season means that it is unlikely to be as a result of Glis Glis. The debris and droppings are relatively minimal but further attempts to trap the rodents will be made.

Heating

Equipment to control the heating in the church remotely have been removed. A new thermostat has been installed in the clergy vestry, and currently a minimal temperature of 13 degrees centigrade with a service temperature of 17.5 degrees centigrade has been set.

Choir vestry

A spring clean of the choir vestry has taken place and shortly the redundant photocopier will be removed and recycled. The security camera which was installed during the pandemic just above the entrance to the choir vestry has been removed, as we became aware that a faculty was required for its continued use.

Security

We are grateful to Paul Woodward-Court for having resolved the problem of the north door becoming stuck. He took the door mechanism apart and removed a small metal fragment that was jamming the locking mechanism.

Service rota

We are grateful as always to Mick Quigley for all his hard work in pulling together the various service rotas that he produces on a quarterly basis.

Reports from the Life of the Church and the Parish

Bell Ringing

The bellringers continued to achieve their primary aim, which is to ring the bells before the Sunday morning matins services. We usually managed to ring all six bells, often with help from ringers from other local towers, Ellesborough, Great Kimble and Stoke Mandeville. We also hosted one of the Diocesan Guild monthly branch practices and the occasional band of visiting ringers.

Our weekly Thursday evening practices have been well attended, again with participation from local towers and we rarely needed to cancel due to low numbers.

It's been a while since we managed to recruit new ringers but in the last few months we have added one regular member to our band, have one ringer in training but injured at the moment and have had enquiries from a new parishioner who wants to join us. So, we may soon be able to reduce the average age of our band from the mid 70s.

Our single source of income is traditionally from wedding payments but the current very low numbers of church weddings mean that we have almost exhausted our hitherto healthy bank balance. This means that should any significant tower maintenance be required, we would need to approach the PCC. Luckily we have a spare rope and a stock of wood that can be used should we get any broken stays. Regular safety checks show that the bells are in good condition.

Churchyard

Landscape

The churchyard extension has now started receiving burials, and so far five burials have taken place across four plots. The location of the first row of plots has been determined after close consultation with local funeral directors and gravediggers. As a result, the section around these new plots is kept in good order, whilst the rest of the churchyard extension continues to be allowed to grow as a wildflower meadow during the spring and for much of the summer.

The churchyard team have continued to work hard on their respective areas throughout the year, and enjoy the work that they undertake. Our thanks go to all those who are part of the team.

Trees

A full Tree Risk Assessment Report was undertaken by arboriculturist Patrick Stileman in October, following the timescale recommended in the previous report of 2023. The recommended works have received approval from the Diocese, and will be undertaken in 2026.

A large amount of ivy was removed from trees in the churchyard, in part to facilitate Patrick Stileman's inspection. This never-ending work will continue this coming year.

Shed

Some maintenance was undertaken on the shed doors to make them slide more easily, and this has worked well. Following the break-in to the shed in November 2024, the foliage masking the sightlines between the shed doors and the church has been thinned, meaning that there is less cover for anyone looking to carry out undesirable activities there.

St Dunstan's Events Team was involved in 14 separate events over the course of 2025, so another busy year. A big thank you to our committed team members who meet occasionally but work tirelessly in the background to ensure the success of a wide range of event types. Thank you also to everyone who supports events by buying tickets, baking cakes, providing salads and puddings, moving furniture, washing up, running stalls, putting up posters etc.

Flowers

A very big thank to the St Dunstan Flower Arrangers who have turned out in all weathers to arrange flowers and maintain them for the enjoyment of the congregation and visitors.

This year the team of arrangers were reduced to 25 with the death of one of our longest serving arrangers, Heather Hobson who is greatly missed. The team continue to provide flowers for the porch, Wilberforce Chapel niche and the High Altar on a fortnightly basis with the flowers being provided by the team as their "contribution". On average the members of the team feature on the rota three times a year with festivals & weddings as extras.

The yearly pattern starts with Mothering Sunday, followed by Easter. As part of Easter, we continue to ask for contributions towards the lilies in memory of loved ones and in 2025 we had more than 44 requests and 80 lilies ordered. The new longiflorum lily to replace the traditional drooping head of the Easter lily has made arranging easier and they last longer. We also arranged flowers for the "Altar of Repose". This year we had three weddings just after Easter which the arrangers really enjoy and excel at; fortunately, the wedding flowers complemented each other and were mainly white so there was no wastage. This was followed by the Bucks Art Week, Harvest Festival, and Remembrance Sunday.

Christmas this year started on the 27th November with the tree arriving for the first Sunday in Advent and dressed in white lights and purple in time for the Advent Fair. The two "angels" were installed above the pulpit and on the bell tower shelf. This was followed by the traditional greenery, mirrors and candles for the concerts and events leading up to Christmas. Two days before Christmas the tree colours change to silver and white and flowers are included in the arrangements. Maintaining the flowers and greenery for 6 weeks in total at a very busy time of year is a challenge and of course taking it all down and packing away not a favourite task but a large team certainly comes in useful.

This year is already proving to be busy with an early Easter and Bucks Art Week on the agenda. We are hoping to organise at least one or two workshops as they are very popular. It would be good to support the annual Monks Risborough Horticulture Show in August with an increase in entries for the flower section!

Gift Aid, Planned Giving and Stewardship

The report covers the claim year April 2024 -2025

The total amount of tax claimed from HMRC amounted to £8844.68

This amount is made up from the 37 regular Gift Aid Donations £21174.00, Total Tax Reclaimed £5293.50

126 Blue Envelope Donors (3 of these donors are also regular gift Aid Donors) £8447.98, Total Tax Reclaim £2112.03.

There were 162 different donors during the year. These numbers are down by two from last year.

From the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (GASDS), this covers the donations which are usually cash donations during the services at St Dunstons' and St Peter & St Paul at Owlswick. This year we were able to claim a tax refund of £1412.38, which is included in the above total amount claimed of £8940.19.

In addition, we received £26.77 of interest from HMRC as the repayment was not made until November.

We still receive a number of donations in Blue Envelopes, which do not qualify for a reclaim as they are incorrectly completed or totally ineligible. These are usually from people attending weddings or funerals who would not be known to us. Our Tax Re-claim is probably reduced by about £50.00 per year because of this. Where I know or recognise the donor of an incorrectly completed blue envelope, I do complete these myself and include them in the claim.

Ann Myers has kindly agreed to cook the main course, and there will be a meeting after the February lunch to plan the way ahead, but the main thing is that this vital social event for people living on their own in the Parish will continue.

Monks Risborough C of E Primary School

Approximately every five years the school receives an inspection from the body responsible for the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS). The school duly received its statutory inspection on 21st March 2025, passing the inspection with many very positive comments, including the following: “Monks Risborough is a welcoming and inclusive church school. Leaders have successfully created a strong sense of family in which adults and pupils are enabled to flourish. The school’s Christian vision, created by the whole school community, is understood and owned by pupils, governors and staff. The school choirs had flourished for many years under the direction of Mrs. Hirst, who retired at the end of the summer term. During the course of the autumn term, new choirs for both the older and younger pupils were set up under the direction of Mrs. Chadwick-Cooper and Mrs. Howard. The new choirs sang at the Christmas lights opening ceremony in Princes Risborough, at the Icknield Court care home and at the Christingle service in St. Dunstan’s Church.

A pupils’ eco-council was set up in the autumn term to promote the children’s respect for the environment and raising their awareness of climate issues, to include initiatives such as “low waste days” and “walk to school weeks”. The outdoor learning area or “forest school” continued to be developed in a variety of ways enabling parts of the curriculum to be taught outside.

At the end of 2025 all places on the school governing body had been filled, except for the vacancy for a third foundation governor representing the church.

Music

As mentioned earlier they are a great help at choir practice, patiently going through pieces note by note, helping with sound, and offering advice where needed. They occasionally take the practice when required, for which I am very grateful.

As I said last year, it only remains for me to thank everyone involved in the music at St Dunstan's for their work, commitment and expertise, which greatly enhances the life and worship of our church.

Organ Fund

Organ Working Group

Previously we reported that our 160-year old organ has many shortcomings, and cannot be relied on as an instrument to support worship at St Dunstan's. This assessment was reinforced by external experts including the diocesan organ advisors.

A representative working group, with guidance from the PCC, investigated a number of options in detail. In December the PCC decided to proceed with a hybrid organ project that will retain the best of the existing organ and enhance it with modern keyboards and playing aids, and also provide a greater range of sounds that will better support congregational singing and the choir for decades to come.

At the time of writing a faculty application is under preparation to secure the necessary diocesan approval for the project to proceed.

Thanks are due to the Working Group members (Jane Curry, Sarah Fairall, Peter Godden, Sue Ingram, David Keysell and Sue Merchant), who have met potential suppliers, reviewed an enormous amount of information, and distilled this into a coherent recommendation for the PCC.

Safer Recruitment

DBS applications were suspended after a data breach in summer 2025. Following this, three DBS applications were completed by the company Thirtyone:Eight. We are now using the company Verifile, as recommended by the Oxford Diocese, and the first DBS application has been processed through them.

Lucy Nott has taken over as DBS Administrator.

Safeguarding Training

One person completed the Basic Safeguarding course.

Ten people completed the Foundation course.

PSO attended two online sessions on safeguarding updates, run by the Safeguarding team at Oxford Diocese.

Parish Safeguarding Dashboard

The Safeguarding Dashboard brings together and streamlines safeguarding policy and practice. It is intended to support parishes in understanding the Church of England safeguarding requirements, and to track progress in meeting these requirements.

The dashboard consists of questions about safeguarding practice in the parish and rates the answer to each as green (completed), amber (work to do) or red (urgent action required). As information is added to the dashboard, it generates an action plan detailing which areas of safeguarding are still to be progressed. The Dashboard was 96-100% complete over the time period.
